## **Clifton Market Opens!**

### Everyone is welcome to shop at new market

The Clifton Market officially opened for business at noon on Sunday January 22. A large group of eager shoppers, including Cincinnati Vice Mayor David Mann, were gathered outside the store as Clifton Market President Adam Hyland and General Manager Keith Brock opened the doors. Council Members Wendell Young and Yvette Simpson joined in the grocery shopping celebration.

Several thousand people made their way through the store during the four-hour sneak peek. Hyland welcomed everyone enterting with a handshake and a "thank you".

There was a lot of energy and excitement amongst customers and staff. Neighbors and friends hugged one another as the remarkable achievement of the community was sinking in. After three years of work by the coop group and six years of a closed store, the dream had come true; Clifton has its grocery store back.

On Monday January 23 Clifton Market started the regular hours of 7 a.m. to midnight every day except for Christmas. The store is open to everyone and you do not have to be a Shareowner to shop.

The Gala Opening Festivities were held over January 26 through 28. The festivities included a treasure hunt for kids, live music, a black tie to blue jeans gala, and concluded with a parade of

carts with a marching band and a ribbon cutting complete with political proclamations.

Hyland said "The store opening is the culmination of thousands of hours of work and financial investment by people who are committed to putting the grocery back in the grocery store. Thank you!

"This store is the economic engine of the business district and we look forward now to working with all the shops and restaurants to make the Ludlow Business District thrive!"

### The New Clifton Area Neighborhood School

Yes! It Is Happening!

Three of Cincinnati's most historic neighborhoods - Clifton, CUF\* and Spring Grove Village - will unite to establish a great new school! We're giving our children guaranteed access to quality public education in an established setting of true cultural diversity.

The CTM Education Committee (newly-named Clifton Area Neighborhood School Steering Committee) has followed a detailed community engagement plan that includes community forums, public events, door-to-door contacts with residents, businesses, civic organizations, neighborhood day care and preschool facilities, play groups for families with young children, outreach through social media, advertising and mailings. We learned that local families consider racial, religious and economic diversity to be a priority for any new student body. Current data shows that real cultural diversity already exists throughout our three neighborhoods, so we anticipate that any new boundary lines drawn up to designate attendance eligibility will favor that quality.

Positive community feedback encourages us that we can make a very strong start, and work will continue to engage even more families now that we've received a formal commitment from CPS to begin our new school.

When and where will this new school begin? In August 2017, a minimum of two classrooms will be reserved by Cincinnati Public Schools at the Vine Street Rising Stars Academy, receiving up to 50 3- to 5-year-old children in Pre Kindergarten and Kindergarten classes. Located at 2120 Vine Street, this "seed" location gives us time to establish a permanent location for our new school, which we anticipate to be somewhere within the boundaries of our three neighborhoods.





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### Deer Project: Year Two

The Clifton deer sterilization project ended its second year of field operations on January 19 with 10 new does sterilized and a bunch of soggy volunteers. This brings the total number of treated deer to 51.

Three nights of operations were originally scheduled for early December but had to be postponed to mid-January because a bumper crop of acorns-deer's favorite food-reduced the draw of the corn baited sites where darters planned to capture remaining untagged does. A

fourth night was added when rain twice forced early termination of activities (unconscious deer are at risk of hypothermia when they get wet). Mother Nature rules!

A second year field camera population survey is now underway and will soon provide the first empirical data on migration patterns and population numbers and characteristics. One thing we already know is that 41 sterilized does this year did not add new fawns to the population. We also know that all of last year's tagged does have been seen over the last year in loca-

tions close to where they were first darted allowing cautious optimism that the premise of the program and the hypothesis of the study—that does tend to stay in one area, could prove to be true. Close study of the camera photos will also help determine how many new does might have moved into the area.

In addition to local news coverage, which you might have seen, the Discovery Channel was here this year filming and interviewing for a national program. Media interest is a good news/ bad news situation. While we're glad and even eager to share what we're doing and learning, additional observers add more moving parts to an already intense and complex operation. Fortunately, all reporters have been understanding and cooperative for which we sincerely thank them.

Costs of operations this year were around \$20,000, about half of last year's. New volunteer veterinarian surgeons were trained, as was a capture specialist, providing progress toward the goal of developing local expertise that might one day take over the jobs now performed by consultants and greatly reduce ongoing program costs. In the meantime, we are very grateful to the Animal Welfare Institute, The Kenneth A. Scott Charitable Trust, a KeyBank Trust, our friend Karyn who gave up her house for a week to the out of town consultants, and to our friends and neighbors whose donations made this year's work possible.

Finally, observations from neighbors are still valuable. Reports of tagged deer seen outside the study area (bounded by Clifton Ave, I-75, and Ludlow Ave.) are particularly important. Sightings of tagged deer inside the study area, especially of the newly sterilized does-#42 through #52, help us monitor the health and condition of our sterilized animals. And reports of untagged does within the area will help us locate the remaining unsterilized does next year (though bucks are now dropping their antlers making them and young antlerless bucks hard to distinguish from does). 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### DePaul Cristo Rey Only Cincinnati School to Receive Innovation Award

Calling the Cristo Rey model, "the coolest thing," Ohio Governor John Kasich honored DePaul Cristo Rey High School and the two other Ohio Cristo Rey schools with the Governor's School Innovation Award. DePaul Cristo Rey (DPCR) was recognized, along with Cristo Rey Columbus and Saint Martin de Porres (Cristo Rey Cleveland), in a ceremony at the Ohio Statehouse on Tuesday, January 24.

There were seven schools and districts statewide recognized by the Governor; De-Paul Cristo Rey was the only Cincinnati-area school honored.

In recognizing the Cristo Rey schools, Governor John Kasich called the urban education model of college-prep academics and Corporate Work Study, "the coolest thing." He said that all the schools recognized "take risks" and "prepare students for the knowledge economy." He said that he hopes these schools inspire "education envy" across the state.

At the awards ceremony, a student from each Ohio Cristo Rey school helped explain the Cristo Rey model and answer questions from the Governor. DPCR senior Joseph Whittle '17 said, "Our school is in its sixth year of operation and all three of our first graduating classes, including mine, have achieved 100 percent college acceptance. I have applied and been accepted to 15 universities; I will be the first in my family to go to college, in addition I will graduate from high school with four years of corporate work experience. This year I work at Wellington Orthopedic and Sports Medicine - Mercy, getting exposure and experience for my future career as a pediatric surgical oncologist."

There are 59 seniors in the Class of 2017, DPCR's largest graduating class so far since its opening in 2011. The seniors will graduate on May 30 in a ceremony at Mount St. Joseph University. Every member of the Class of 2017 has been accepted to at least one college, most have been accepted to multiple schools. See full story in the online *Chronicle*.

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

Kindergarten at the Rising Stars Academy on Vine Street, which puts them in line for admission to Fairview GLS Kindergarten when they turn 5-years-old.

On September 14, 2015, Clifton Town Meeting (CTM) voted to create an ad-hoc Education Committee comprised of CTM Trustees and community members. They were asked to seek solutions for both short and long-term plans towards creation of a new quality neighborhood elementary school. Over the past 15 months, dozens of residents from Clifton, CUF and Spring Grove Village have worked to fulfill this task. Also, a "Working Group" comprised of Fairview parents, representatives from Clifton Cultural Arts Center, members from Clifton Town Meeting, CUF and Spring Grove Village councils convened to identify and visit many potential sites for both short and longterm accommodation for young students.

For a short-term solution, we suggested to CPS to begin two classrooms for the 2017-18 school year at Rising Stars Academy on Vine to meet the immediate needs of our neighborhoods. Although many families have already established preschool arrangements, there is great need for 5-year-olds to begin their education within CPS before they are forced onto the voucher track. Therefore, CPS agreed to open one PreK and one Kindergarten class next fall. After this start-up, we'll better identify true demand for a projected total enrollment in a permanent new school, better estimating the correct size and location. Growth of additional class rooms could follow annually with addition of needed grade levels.

The CTM Education Committee (newly-named Clifton Area Neighborhood School Steering Committee) has followed a detailed community engagement plan that includes community forums, public events, door-todoor contacts with residents, businesses, civic organizations, neighborhood day care and preschool facilities, play groups for families with young children, outreach through social media, advertising and mailings. We learned that local families consider racial, religious and economic diversity to be a priority for any new student body. Current data shows that real cultural diversity already exists throughout our three neighborhoods, so we anticipate that any new boundary lines drawn up to designate attendance eligibility will favor that quality.

To date (2/2/17) we've gathered signatures on petitions in support of the idea of a new elementary school (261 current signatures) and on "intent to enroll" forms (38 current potential students). This positive community feedback

encourages us that we can make a very strong start, and work will continue to engage even more families now that we've received a formal commitment from CPS to begin our new school. Please stay tuned and participate in our community engagement forum, beginning with your ...



### Clifton Teen Takes Step into Past with Mechanical Spider

There's just something about the Pre-Industrial era for Seven Hills School senior Scott Arnold. The span of time between 1750 and 1850 was a time of simplicity, when very little was known about the way things move, and, when making things go required a great deal of hard work, sweat, danger, and grit. For a student who feels at home in his computer science class, Arnold's appreciation for the steam era has a lot to do with the fact that it is the un-Now.



Arnold's interests fueled his desire to build a mechanical spider out of vintage Erector Set materials. An avid strategic gamer, Arnold said he enjoyed making something that required no electricity, no Arduinos, no motherboards.

During Seven Hills' required Personal Challenge project in mid-January, Arnold explained from start to finish, the concept, research, and process involved in bringing his half-arachnoid, half-vehicular creature to life. At an outdoor location on the school campus, Arnold lit fuel in a matchbox-size coal chamber in the belly of the steam-powered engine while his peers and teachers watched the machine go. The mechanical beast took timid steps, with the inside four limbs creeping forward, followed by the outside set.

"Scott learned a lot about the design process and he encountered a variety of issues

that he did not anticipate and had to troubleshoot, in order for his Steam Spider to function properly," said Personal Challenge advisor and math teacher Anne Ramsay, adding that Personal Challenge invites Seven Hills upperclassman to explore something of interest at a deep and meaningful level. "His steam spider project served as a fantastic problem-solving opportunity."

Arnold's passion for the stuff of bygone eras flows into his musical talents as well. An accomplished violinist in his school's symphonic ensemble, he is also a top-notch fiddler with the Riley School of Music, a local cultural organization that preserves and showcases traditional Irish music. Arnold's Irish violin solos can transport an audience, who wouldn't know the 17-year-old discovered his talent of articulating intricate Irish music only four years ago. Arnold plans to pursue a degree in mechanical engineering next fall.



### A Tribute to Famed Local Architect Samual Hannaford at Library


It's a fitting tribute to famed local architect Samuel Hannaford that his tools are on display in one of the residences he designed, thanks to the Curate My Community initiative from the Cincinnati Museum Center. While the museum's renovation is ongoing several Library branches are home to artifact displays, including the Clifton Branch Library.

Born in England, Hannaford immigrated when he was 9 with his family to Cincinnati. He attended public schools and graduated from Farmer's College in Cincinnati, where he studied architecture. Hannaford opened an office in 1857, and in 1887 formed the firm of Samuel Hannaford & Sons. Some of his notable designs include Music Hall, Cincinnati City Hall, the Cincinnati Observatory, the Elsinore Arch, and the Wiedemann Brewery.

In 1894, George "Boss" Cox hired Hannaford to design his new home, Parkview Manor, located at 3400 Brookline Ave. Cox was the son of British immigrants and became a saloonkeeper who controlled Cincinnati politics for over 25 years. He ran for city council to gain the power to stop police from busting up his bar. Cox became Cincinnati's most notorious politician, ruling City Hall from the high-end saloons Wielert's.

Parkview Manor is an Italianate polychromatic stone building, with a prominent three-story turret. The foundation walls are Indiana limestone and the exterior walls are coursed sandstone backed with limestone. Features of note in the house





include circular and triangular shaped rooms, and architectural elements such as stained glass windows, chandeliers, and hand-carved mantles and newel posts.

The Cox family lived in the manor until the death of Cox's wife, Caroline, in 1938. Afterwards, owners of the house included the University of Cincinnati, which purchased the property in 1939 and converted it into a women's dormitory, and a chapter



of Pi Kappa Alpha, which used the building as a fraternity house.

The house was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. It was converted into the Clifton Branch Library in 2015.

Other Clifton-area buildings Hannaford designed include the Balch House on Greendale Avenue, St. George's Church, and Van Wormer Library at the University of Cincinnati.

The public is invited to drop by the Clifton Branch Library and see Hannaford's drawing tools. The Library also has several of his drawings in its digital library at Digital.CincinnatiLibrary.org/.

### Congratulations, Clifton Teen Success Stories

Finding a job for a teen is not an easy prospect for those involved in the search. First, you have to find a place that wants to hire a young person. Second, you have to choose youth, with little or no experience, willing to work. Prospective employers of teens should be prepared to offer guidance and encouragement to succeed, ("You're doing a good job answering the phones, and so would you like to learn a new skill today?). Young employees aren't always able to discern real world consequences, ("What do you mean I'm not being paid to text on the job?").

The job internship process is hard to ensure the right fit for employers and candidates. Perhaps we should describe teenagers to employers as Potential in Progress: and full of possibilities. Assured for both employers and employees, teens are ever evolving and capable of surprising results and sometimes greatness.

Great things may include a young person finding their connection to the community. Allowing teens to develop their own interests may lead to a career opportunity and, or, focusing on a degree program. Appreciating the investment of an intern program may help develop strategies for keeping valued part-time staff. Taking a chance on a young person early in this process may pay off in the long run,

as they ready to apply for employment, with training previously provided by the employer.

Such a story is the path that Chase Brown-Strayhorn has pursued at Cincinnati Recreation Commission. For many years in after school activities as a young day camper he learned the structure of playing games and sharing social interactions among his peers. "Being Safe and Having Fun" were among the important lessons gleaned from these experiences. He approached his first job as a CRC teen intern with a readiness of how to play and how to lead a game: two very valuable skills that can be applied to many a life experience. He practiced these skills during his summer camp intern experience and carried them into a second year of the Y2W program, (Youth to Work, formerly known as the Mayor's Youth Employment Program). After a few years at CRC, Chase then applied to the Cincinnati Parks program, and worked as a Green Team participant for a summer.

Jazmynn Ramsey, also a senior at Walnut Hills High School, has had a similar experienced path to CRC. As a junior counselor at Lincoln Center she learned her first job experiences as a front desk staff and arts and crafts helper. She continued her job training through the rec in-

tern program, leading group games and helping children with fieldtrip activities. Her next adventure included duties as a police cadet for two summers. Creative, outgoing and a hard worker are all terms she uses to describe herself.

New School Montessori teacher, Johnnyé White, invited Stephanie Rechtin to be a guest speaker. Johnnyé often brings speakers to her elementary Appreciating Difference Classes to encourage children to learn about people's differences and to be comfortable asking questions.

Stephanie Rechtin was born with cerebral palsy and Asperger's. Although speaking, walking, and visual processing are more difficult for Stephanie because of her disabilities, she says that other tasks come quite easily for her. For instance, Stephanie was reading at the age of 3 and attended school with her peers, studying English and psychology in college.

Just like all of us, Stephanie uses gad-

gets to help her in areas where she is weak. She uses a wheelchair when her muscles are too tired to go the distance using her crutches. She uses the GPS on her cell phone, as many of us do, to help her find her way to places she wants to go. Since she has trouble with focus and can forget that it's time to go home or to remember to eat, her cell phone sends her helpful reminder messages throughout the day.

Stephanie shared a message with the children that we all have things we're good at and things we need help with. She encouraged the students to ask for help when they need it and to use gadgets to assist them in achieving their independence and

### DePaul Cristo Rey Celebrates 100 Percent College Acceptance for Third Year in a Row

For the third year in a row DePaul Cristo Rey High School's senior class has achieved 100 percent college acceptance. Every member of the Class of 2017 has been accepted to at least one college, most have been accepted to multiple schools, and these seniors have already earned \$3.8 million in merit-based academic scholarships. And the acceptance letters and scholarship awards continue to arrive in seniors' mailboxes.

The announcement of 100 percent acceptance was made in a pep-rally style celebration on January 17 that included confetti cannons, standing ovations and words of wisdom from English teacher Dr. Manuel Iris who told the seniors, "Life will change in ways that you cannot imagine and will not always be good. Community development is multi-disciplined work. Uptown Consortium, Inc. (UCI) and our partners must be strategic about immediate and future opportunities and challenges for Uptown Cincinnati's five core neighborhoods: Avondale, Clifton, Corryville, CUF and Mt. Auburn. An interdisciplinary approach to identifying, reviewing and selecting the best opportunities for Uptown institutions, businesses and residents is the key to this district's future, which is central to our entire region.

### YourUptown

With more than \$1 billion in private real estate and \$200 million in UCI investments, we face the important challenge of supporting the ecology between small businesses, entrepreneurs and anchor institutions. Part of that support comes in the form of a tried-and-true concept: shop local. Buying local means your money is directly invested in the community, giving you a reason to feel good about an extra shopping splurge. This support provides community sustainability and makes Uptown a more vibrant and attractive location for future businesses, residents and visitors.

shin hanga (new prints) and sōsaku hanga (creative prints). Thematically, the prints represent fine examples of bijinga or beautiful women, theatrical prints of actors, literature and legend, landscape, bird prints and surimono (privately printed prints).

Selections from the Weisman collection will be featured in the upcoming special exhibition Dressed to Kill: Japanese Arms & Armor. In 2006, the Weismans donated 82 prints, which were featured in the exhibition Public Spectacles, Personal Pleasures: Four Centuries of Japanese Prints from a Cincinnati Collection.

The Weismans began collecting Japanese prints in 1956. Over a lifetime, the couple established a comprehensive collection as a promised bequest to the Cincinnati Art Museum. Joel, who passed away in April 2016, focused on collecting to showcase the historical development of the prints. Bernice, a 30-year museum volunteer, explored the tradition of cats in 17th-20th century Japanese printmaking.

For Bernice, amassing the collection has been a joy and an ongoing adventure. "Collecting led us into a culture that we knew little about when we began. Discovering new facts and insights over the years has been incredibly rewarding," she said.

In addition to their collection, the Weismans have given their extensive reference library, auction and dealers catalogues to the Mary R. Schiff Library to facilitate research on Japanese prints and art.
