The Cincinnati Police

At the park, neighborhood volunteers have a grill loaded with burgers, veggie burgers, hot dogs and all the typical fixings along with soda, juice and water. Donations for food and drink are accepted.

### Tom Reese 2019 CTM Golf Outing's "Friend of Clifton"

Each year at the CTM Golf Outing we present the "Friend of Clifton Award" to someone who makes Clifton the unique and wonderful place it is. This year's Friend of Clifton is Thomas Reese. If you ever visit the Clifton Recreation Center (aka CRC) or any of the various events in and around Clifton, you almost certainly know Tom. Tom is the current Service Area Coordinator, (manager), of the Clifton Recreation Center. The CRC is a core element of Clifton serving more than 100 children from our area each day throughout the year. They offer many educational and sports programs, games, activities, almost anything for both the young and "more experienced" members of our community. The CRC also is the meeting place for CTM. Tom plays a leading part in making the CRC, its programing and partnerships a great success.

The Cincinnati Recreation Centers have long been a part of Tom's life. He grew up going to the centers and taking advantage of the programing. One of his first jobs was part-time work for the Cincinnati Recreation Department as a touring puppeteer in a theatre group called the Mythfits. After attending university and acquiring several degrees, Tom returned to the Cincinnati Recreation Department part time as an art and theater teacher. 

### UC DAAP Students Brainstorm Plans for A Pedestrian Friendly Ludlow

University of Cincinnati DAAP (Design, Art, Architecture and Planning) students met in April to brainstorm ideas to make Ludlow Avenue more pedestrian friendly. Their professor Vikas Mehta said they hope to present their ideas to Clifton Town Meeting in May. He says the real value of using DAAP would be to run a full studio with 15 to 20 students, then of course, he said, "the ideas are much broader, and we run it through the whole semester." He was surprised to learn from Malcolm Montgomery, Mica Ovadia, Catherine Hamilton Hicks, Seth Maney and other Cliftonians who were present that something like this has never been tried before.

In response to the question of "what is possible working with the city?" Professor Mehta said they want to take some solutions to them and see how much they are willing to work with the community.

If you need a new tree in your tree lawn (road verge), you can contact the Cincinnati Parks Department of Urban Forestry to request that they plant an appropriate tree, at no charge! They will visit you and discuss what tree you might prefer, and then arrange a planting and

mulching within about three to six months as the season permits. Just call 513-357-2604, or visit their website <a href="www.cincinnatiparks.com/urban-forestry">www.cincinnatiparks.com/urban-forestry</a> to get started. And if you have room in your yard—either front or back—where there are no powerlines overhead, you might want to plant a good hardwood or other native tree to be there for generations to come.





ant Ridge Center and in 2008 became the SAC of our Clifton Recreation Center. He has served in that post for the past 11 years, since colleague and previous manager Dale Doerman, retired!

Tom was involved in the planning and visioning of the 2015 renovation of the CRC. He advocated for the improved audio visual systems and technology through the facility, the enhanced and added classroom spaces, and many other elements that make the center more functional than ever.

The Rec Center faces challenges each year such as budget constraints and often reductions which Tom must lead his team through to deliver the highest quality services our center is known for. There is a need to constantly adapt to changing situations and unexpected issues. Few things stay the same and there is a lot of non-routine work. Tom finds this very motivating.

Coming up with quality and interesting programming for the children is one of the core responsibilities his team has. This can be athletic or classroom activity, or even theatre. Most recently Tom has directed an original play called "Staged w/Jenny," featuring Jenny Trier, which will tour at various locations.

Over the years Tom has helped nurture children at the facility and watched them grow from grade school age and youth programming, to teenagers perhaps doing parttime work at the facility, and finally a few who have returned to work or use the facility as adults. His advice, "Go to work and contribute every day, the kids can tell if you are not really into the job."

Tom will be recognized as this year's Friend of Clifton at the 7th Annual CTM Golf Outing at Avon Fields Golf Course on Saturday, August 24 after conclusion of play (around 7 p.m.). 



### **Spring 2019 Clifton Deer Update**

It has been a little more than three years since CliftonDeer.org began spaying the deer in a one square mile area of Clifton, and the most recent progress report shows it's working!

The population survey conducted in February found the number of deer resident in the study area (bounded by Clifton Avenue, Ludlow Avenue, and I-75) shrank from about 99 to about 74, for a ~25 percent reduction since the first doe was sterilized in December of 2015. That's good news for the parks, Clifton gardeners, drivers, and our hoofed neighbors.

More importantly: An estimated 94 percent of the adult does in the area now are sterilized which should greatly reduce future births for years to come; and there has been little immigration of new deer into the study area, supporting our optimism that the deer population will continue to decline through attrition over time. How fast is another question.

Study and learn! The population drop could have been closer to 30 percent. Why wasn't it?

- Some of the deer sterilized early in the project were able to regenerate ovaries from remnant tissue and have fawns. We modified our surgical method since the first year, re-treated affected does, and are monitoring the herd to see if anyone else should be re-treated.
- Also Clifton deer have an extremely low death rate. The does are impressive-

ly healthy (well nourished, and no ticks or diseases found) and fewer are killed in collisions than in other communities with similar programs. (Thank you, Clifton drivers.)

In other news, we continue to build local knowledge and resources in an effort to reduce dependence on out of town consultants, and ultimately to lower costs:

- Our partnership with UCAN, a non-profit spay and neuter clinic located just minutes from Clifton, is providing a state-of-the-art surgical facility, and a warm base camp on cold January nights for the capture and transport teams.
- Experienced volunteer surgeons from UCAN and elsewhere are learning the ovariectomy procedure, bringing high volume spay/neuter experience,

and enthusiasm, to the project.

• Our local darter-in-training is in his second year of learning all aspects of deer capture and release, and has already successfully darted four deer.

Another initiative this year is to treat border deer—those who primarily reside outside the study area, but whose territory crosses into it. If you live east of Clifton Avenue or south of Ludlow and notice tagged deer in your yards, that's why.


Finally, it has been suggested that the project be expanded to include neighborhoods south of Ludlow or east of Clifton Avenue. ### Homage to Clifton's Old Streetcars ...

Much homage is due our old streetcars, as they ultimately enabled the building and burgeoning of the more modest homes and apartments which more broadly define what we know as Clifton today.

These structures really started to appear at the turn of the century (about 1890 - 1910) in waves of construction. Sales of the homes during this period was almost entirely dependent upon the ability of good streetcars to whisk folks to work in the basin and back home by evening. It is no coincidence that the colossal apartment buildings, built by Thomas Emery, et al., such as The Rosyln, The Roanoke, The Romaine, The Rutland, The Delmoor and The Maplewood, were all built right on the streetcar lines commencing after the first electric streetcars appeared in 1889.

Two new routes came through Clifton. The first was the 55 Vine-Clifton (originating at 5th and Walnut downtown), coming down Jefferson to Ludlow, right on Telford, left on Bryant, right on Middleton, to right on McAlpin and ending at Clifton School, where the lineman simply walked to the rear of the streetcar (which also had controls), and drove back in the reverse direction. Later, buses required a turn-around be built at this point into the Rawson pasture (evident today). And, how the streetcars climbed back up the Middleton Avenue hill, I will never know but I do remember hearing much wheel screeching. Plus, just imagine these large streetcars maneuvering the sharp turns on Telford and Bryant Streets - wow!

The second route was the 61 Clifton-Ludlow (originating at 6th and Walnut downtown), came down Clifton Av-

enue into Clifton, then left onto Ludlow, then down all the way through Northside on Hamilton Avenue, and ending at Springlawn Avenue before reversing for its return run. In addition, there was a Short Route, #65, which just circled through the Telford-Bryant-Middleton area before heading back downtown, and not out through Northside. This duplication speaks to the volume of people living in the gaslight hub.

So either by agreement or collusion, the streetcars provided the necessary people to rent all the apartments and buy the myriad of surrounding homes, while satisfying the intense desire of people to move

to the "burbs" (sound familiar?) away from the stench in the basin areas. This general movement came first to Mt. Auburn, then to Corryville, Walnut Hills and Avondale, followed by Clifton and Hyde Park—all then largely considered streetcar communities.

To entice home buyers and renters to Clifton, the architecture of this period had to have the "wow factor" in appearance, often using more than one motif-such as Chateauesque, Romanesque, Gothic, Neo-Classic, Flemish, Beaux Arts and Colonial Revival—all to impress and lend complexity for the eye to marvel at.

Some asymmetry was usually thrown in to give a counterbalancing tartness to any over embellishments. This architectural movement called "eclectic", "aesthetic" and "composite", all created a Camelotlike affect for those coming up from the blandness of the basin in search of a dream These "blends" of architecture signaled an exciting break from the classic-traditional rigidity of balance and symmetry—especially appealing for those who so wanted to identify with the new modernism and display ostentatious status. Chateauesque and Flemish seems to have been the most popular "blend" in Clifton with their turrets and Flemish Gables and, perhaps, even a Romanesque Arch thrown in the mix. My grandmother, who grew up during this period, described such houses as "swell homes". No matter the architectural style, these homes all flaunted stained glass windows and massive front doors of oak, often with asymmetric panels to further confirm their break from classical orders to this new freedom of design. Amazingly, most of these original and interesting front doors have stood the test of time and still boast of the home's importance.

For an added touch, gaslights on the streets had been installed as early as 1875 by the Globe Light Company at \$29 each, and later improved by the Welsbach Company, which replaced the less reliable Globe lamps and burn to this day.

For shopping, inhabitants could just walk to Ludlow Avenue and send the kids off to the new Clifton Public School to complete suburban life. Over time, Ludlow would support a Kroger (CVS today), an Albers (Grill of India and Habanero restaurants today), Clifton Fruit Market and Yaeger Meats (Sitwells today), Keller's (now Clifton Market), Adolph Meyer's, and three drug stores: Dows, Stier's and Pahner's. Of course, now most Cliftonites just drive their cars to shop elsewhere, right?

All of this started in Cincinnati in 1859 with the first horsecars (streetcars pulled by teams of horses), serving primarily the basin areas—until the advent of the inclines in 1872, 1876 and 1894, known as the Mt. Auburn, The Bellevue and The Fairview inclines respectively, to scale the hills, spare the horses, and there-




"Bellview Incline" crossing above Clifton Ave. passing the old Medical College, supported by stone pillars still visible today.

by now give the horsecars mass access into Clifton. The two other inclines, the Mt. Adams and the Price Hill inclines, served those neighborhoods. Prior to this period, one horsecar line did come out of Corryville as early as 1859 to terminate at Jefferson and Brookline (Clifton boundary then) and also to the zoo, but not into the gaslight area yet. In fact, these "lines" were

individually owned until later consolidation improved operations. Other areas, not served by horsecars, were reached by scant omnibus lines (similar to stagecoaches).

Another solution to ascending the hills and sparing the horses, were cable cars or streetcars, pulled by buried cable running up the center of Gilbert Avenue, Vine and

Sycamore Streets. Once these cable cars reached the summits, they were hooked

to awaiting horse teams and off to the routes, becoming horsecars. Two of the power houses for the cables still stand today at the top of Gilbert Avenue, and at Dorchester and Highland Avenues. The streetcars themselves were built by the Cincinnati Car Company, which had an impressive stone factory on Spring

Groveand Mitchell Avenues (now an auto parts store—ugh!).

Then, with the advent of the electrified streetcar in 1889, and all of their superior

efficiencies, new tracks were laid into Clifton to accommodate the aforementioned building during those years, and is what actually created Clifton and allowed it to function so well for generations—despite their characteristic clanging sound, which became more like a heartbeat for its riders. And yes, they also had an old-world charm, now lost to obtuse belching motorized bus-

es. The last #61 rolled down Clifton Avenue in April of 1949 and signaled the end of a grand era, however, their service gave us Clifton as we see it today, hence our homage to the streetcars and all those horses who served us as well.

### Fairview Clifton German Language School Fasching Parade of Masks

On Friday March 15, the day before Fasching, a parade circled Fairview Clifton German Language School with all classes participating in the event in their created masks. The band accompanied. On Saturday, March 16 Fairview Clifton German Language School turned into a spring carnival with games, prizes, auctions, raffles, bouncy rides, and German foods and sweets. Fasching celebrates spring with a parade of masks on Friday. This popular community tradition is open to the public, so all family and friends were invited to celebrate.

Fasching can be traced back to pagan times. It started as an event to drive out the winter and the ghosts of darkness who had begun to lose their powers as the springtime sun started to warm the earth. Rituals in these areas included processions where people generate lots of noise and masquerade with horrifying face masks in order to scare away the ghosts of winter and at the same time avoid their revenge. It was also a festival to honor the Goddess Freya and to celebrate fertility with the beginning of spring.

Early missionaries tried to shift the meaning of this celebration to a more Christian ritual, and so the carnival came to mark the beginning of Lent—a time of reflection and abstinence from eating meat, eggs or dairy until Easter.

The days before Lent would be the last opportunity to eat these foods for 40 days and therefore a great excuse for parties and feasts. This is the origin of the alias name Karneval as it is derived from Latin carne vale, meaning 'farewell to meat'. In the Middle Ages, this command was not too difficult to follow because food stocks usually were expended by this time of year, and it was a good idea to consume the remaining stocks, which would most likely start to rot in the following weeks.

Another tradition is Starkbier (stout). This is a very potent beer brewed by the monks at this time for use during Lent, when they were not allowed to eat. They made up for the calories by drinking this darker, richer beer. The famous Starkbier-Anstich (celebration of opening the first Starkbier keg) at the Nockherberg facility in Munich is a story in itself...

Many people often wonder why monks—of all people—were allowed to drink such strong beer during their fasts. As the Legend goes, they originally trans-





ported the beer over the Alps to distant Rome in order to convince the "Holy Father" of its suitability for fasting. When they eventually reached the Pope, however, it had turned sour and was undrinkable. The Pope had no qualms, therefore, about permitting the monks

to use the beer as liquid sustenance during Lent.

### Washington Avenue Becoming "Greener"

If you have driven down Washington Avenue in North Avondale this year, you may have noticed two new home projects on the hill; a brand new home located at 3736 Washington Avenue, and an existing home remodel with some additions at 3720 Washington Avenue. IKOTA Management was hired for both projects to attain GOLD LEED Standard, and contracted with Green Building Consulting to help navigate the way.

LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) is a consensus-based set of building standards administered by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC),

a nonprofit organization. LEED was created to help guide the construction of healthier, highly efficient buildings that reduce waste and are better for communities and the environment. The LEED rating system, used worldwide, has four levels – Certified, Silver, Gold and Platinum – depending on how high a building scores on the LEED point system.

The homes go beyond just Energy Star appliances, from spacing of framing lumber, non-toxic and local materials used, water and heat efficiency fixtures, all the way to what type of grass seed used outside. The owners of LEED projects feel like winners



all around, from tax abatements enjoyed, helping reduce environmental strains/ emissions, and overall improvement quality of living.— Rasheed Shamma of IKOTA Management


### Artist Speak: Kiersten Pfeiffer




### Finely Tuned at Lydia's

Through this program all DPCR students work five days a month at one of the 100 partner companies, earning part of their education costs and gaining valuable professional skills and exposure.

Governor DeWine, formerly the Ohio Attorney General, is very familiar with DePaul Cristo Rey and the Columbus and Cleveland Cristo Rey schools. The Attorney General's Office participates in the CWSP with students working in their offices in all three cities.

### **CWC Hosts 125th Anniversary Luncheon**

Seven enterprising women founded The Cincinnati Woman's Club in 1894 with the expressed purpose of furthering education and philanthropy. During 2019, the CWC has celebrated this milestone with a variety of events reflecting that mission. Recently, leaders from 60 Cincinnati organizations that have been in existence for at least 125 years joined CWC members for a 125th Anniversary Luncheon, co-chaired by Shannon Carter and Pat Humphrey. Guests included representatives from the business and health care communities, educational and religious institutions, the arts and other civic organizations.

In her welcome, CWC President Ellen Zemke described this event as a chance to celebrate Cincinnati's heritage and to find connections and avenues for working together in the future. Ellen Katz, president and CEO of the Greater Cincinnati Foundation, then led a panel discussion, "Connecting Women in the Future of Our Community." She noted that Cincinnati has exceptional female leaders in philanthropy, the arts, education and business and introduced the panelists representing those areas. She then asked each panelist how her organization was distinguished and what she saw as the challenge for the future.

ArtsWave CEO Alicia Kintner said that Cincinnati is the home of some of the country's top arts organizations with significant community support and women in key leadership roles. She noted that the expansion of arts exposure in education is a means of teaching skills like creative problem solving and teamwork that are of critical importance in the work force both today and in the future.

Laura Mitchell, Superintendent of Cincinnati Public Schools, noted that the 190 year-old Cincinnati Public School System continues to grow, offering more educational choices every year. The system also serves as a national model for incorporating community services like health care into school sites. Her organization's most pressing challenge is finding ways to finance its growth.

Jill Meyer, CEO of the Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber, said that her organization is one of the largest of its type in the country, distinguished by its regional scope and its broad engagement with the local business community. Her list of future "work to do" includes a regional transportation system and a focus on developing and keeping local talent while attracting talent from outside the region.

This lively discussion gave CWC members and guests many ideas to discuss as they enjoyed the elegant three-course luncheon that followed. Each guest received a copy of The Life of the Future, a book created by the CWC to commemorate its 125th Anniversary.
