# President's Message

Our Walkable Clifton

This Summer newsletter spotlights Clifton's walkability and engaging environment. As we become more health and environment aware, a community's walkability moves to the center in debates about quality of life. What makes Clifton walkable? An easy answer would be the number of services located within a resident's walking distance. This issue publishes a current list of Clifton businesses and services all reachable on foot, an outreach of "Welcome" to the hundreds of university students arriving over the summer. Great walkability goes beyond Clifton's boundaries. Steve Schuckman's 5-mile annotated hiking map leads you through Burnet Woods and through CUF, highlighting rich history to be discovered while walking just for pleasure. Another map and narrative by Alice Palmer and Mary Steele — the 4-mile trek past  ${\it notable\ Clifton\ gardens-demonstrates\ our}$ sustained commitment to natural beauty and well-being. Top off your water bottle, lace up your shoes, apply sunscreen and begin your journey to a thousand destinations.

In Clifton, walking is not just about going from point A to point B. Every block brings discovery. Safer school crossings — thanks to Councilmember Mark Jeffreys' request that crossing guards be paid a decent wage — boosted hiring to fill empty posts. Bright yellow portable warning flags — thanks to CANS students' work supported by a Keep Cincinnati Beautiful grant and CTM's Transportation Committee — provide greater visibility at busy intersections.

CTM has been working for years to improve pedestrian safety. Our latest goal is to improve conditions within our business district through an application for an NBDIP grant (Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program.) If awarded, we'll be able to study and design practical changes for improved traffic flow and safety at the Ludlow and Clifton intersection, factoring in the presence of the new CCAC building scheduled to open in early 2024.

Please join us in the Memorial Day Parade and Picnic at Mount Storm Park on Monday, May 29. Starting at Middleton and McAlpin avenues at 10:30 a.m. bring your decorated bikes and costumed pets which add charm to this tradition!

## **Clifton Welcome & Connect**

The first edition of **Clifton Welcome & Connect** (CWC) is nearly in the books, with the final event taking place on Memorial Day when all participants of CWC are invited to join in the Clifton Parade and Picnic at Mt. Storm Park — our traditional beginning of summer and a quintessential American celebration!

CWC was born from outreach by the Clifton Branch Library to CTM, asking what impactful project we could do in partnership. Demonstrating once again that we are a creative and cooperative neighborhood with problem-solving ideas, CWC has proven useful already by helping new immigrants from Pakistan, Mexico, India, Sudan, Turkey, Morocco, Japan, and France. Designed to provide essential (and at times, unusual) information on how to access and use practical services, CWC provided information on transportation, education, health care, housing, and immigration. Cincinnati Compass — a program of the Chamber of Commerce — and the Library helped us to assemble experts for these topics, demonstrating again their real importance in our lives.

This new program could not have happened without the seven hosting partners who have provided welcoming locations for participants to meet with experts. A big thanks to Clifton Rec Center (topic: Clifton 101), Library (Transportation), CANS (Education), the Clifton Mosque (Health Care), Immanuel Presbyterian Church (Housing), All Nations Church (Immigration) and the Cincinnati Park Board (Memorial Day Picnic).

The creators of CWC knew that Spring might not be an optimal time to launch this program, as most new immigrants arrive in Clifton just before the Fall startup of university classes. But we proceeded anyway in April 2023 to test the program and make improvements in time for Fall 2023. Know some newcomers? # **Investing in Neighborhood Business Districts - City Hall Corner**

Business districts are an indispensable part of our neighborhoods throughout the city and especially here in Clifton. The vitality of those business districts requires investment and nurturing by residents, community organizations, and

local government. I want to thank all the residents who volunteer countless hours to help maintain the vibrancy of our neighborhood business districts, cleaning up litter on a daily basis, planting and maintaining flowers, clearing gutters of leaves and debris, being the eyes and ears for the police, and advocating for better policies overall. That advocacy helps not only community councils like the Clifton Town Meeting to articulate the collective needs of neighborhoods, but in turn helps City Council make budget choices.

As we finish up the City's fiscal year ending in June, and settting budgets for FY 23/24, investment in neighborhoods and their business districts is a top priority for me and my colleagues. That investment and advocacy entail:

**Pedestrian safety** – Department of Transportation and Engineering (DOTE) recently started deploying what are called "hardened centerlines" at Clifton Avenue and Ludlow Avenue as well as other corners throughout the city. These installations along with speed cushions and speed bumps are some of the continued investments needed to make it safer to walk in the Clifton Business District. Still, there's a lot more work to be done along Ludlow and in surrounding blocks to make our streets safer. In the upcoming budget, I have pushed for continued

strong investment in pedestrian infrastructure.

### Investing in neighborhood development -

Entering the next budget cycle, City Council has already approved funding of \$1.2 million of federal grant dollars for community development corporations. This funding paired with the City's annual investment in neighborhood business districts is another example of the multi-faceted approach this Council has taken to strengthen our neighborhoods.

Partnering with Cincinnati Police Department on **business district safety issues** – Clifton's business district—like so many others— continues the need for strong partnerships between CPD and neighborhood leaders. Ideally, this means getting officers out on foot patrol. Unfortunately, the Police Chief has expressed that staffing shortages will preclude that in the short term. The City's new Alternative Response Model (non-violent offenses are responded to by a paramedic and social worker) is a great example of the City's capacity to innovate. We need to continue to identify new, creative solutions to establish public safety in business districts.

All of these policy priorities are critical to insuring that neighborhood business districts are vibrant. In Clifton, we are fortunate to have great partnerships among our local government, the community council, and residents. As always, I invite everyone to reach out to me at any time with concerns. 

# Can Public Art Make Sidewalks Safer? by Justin Ogilby



Two of my favorite things about Clifton are walkability and our embrace and support of the arts. Over the past several months, community groups have been working to combine these two concepts to improve safety throughout our neighborhood. Representatives from CTM, CBA, CCAC, and others have applied for a Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program (NBDIP) grant from the City, focused on using art to improve street safety by drawing attention to problem intersections. If awarded, the grant will fund a raised crosswalk at Ludlow and Ormond avenues and, perhaps more importantly, fund a comprehensive design study to create plans that will use art and street calming techniques to improve pedestrian experience and safety when walking, crossing, or just being near streets throughout our neighborhood. These City grant programs allow Clifton to make efficient requests for funding as well as position us to apply for other grant opportunities that expedite improvements. Keep your fingers crossed, grant results will be announced in late June.

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

### A Four-Mile Clifton Gardens Hike

**Description:** Clifton Plaza starting point, through Burnet Woods, through the older streets of Clifton, Mt. Storm Park and down Middleton, Evanswood and Dunore.

Get your steps in while sampling the diversity of Clifton spring and summer gardens! So many residents beautify our neighborhood with plantings big and small. This pathway takes you past just a few. We are grateful to the gardeners and volunteers who help maintain the beauty of our public spaces.

We've noted approximate mileage from point-topoint, and remember: Clifton is hilly! Wear good walking shoes and carry your drinking water. Like our forebears, refill your bottle with fresh city water at the Probasco Fountain's peony spout, located in front of Clifton Area Neighborhood School.

Start in the heart of the Gaslight business district at the (1) Clifton Plaza Garden, backdrop for the new bandstand. The garden on the terrace;s west edge displays five historic millstones. The plaque at right tells their history.

Turn right out onto Ludlow, walk east, then turn right at the firehouse onto Clifton Avenue. At the corner of Clifton and Dixmyth is the (2) Clifton Community Garden, where individual gardeners rent plots to grow vegetables for themselves. Contact the Civic Garden Center if you'd like a plot there next year: kmontgomery@civicgardencenter.org

Cross Clifton Avenue and scale Burnet Woods Lane, pass the bandstand, bear left when the road branches and head down the hill to Burnet Woods Lake. Turn left, pass (3) Trailside Nature Center's Garden,



walk northward on Brookline, and cross Ludlow to the Library. (You have completed 1 mile!)

Continue on Brookline towards Hosea. In early summer see a large iris

garden at #3425/3427 Brookline, then cross Hosea where on the corner is a (4) lovely garden behind the yew hedge. Turn left on Hosea, walk westward and past the brick roadblock towards Clifton Avenue. Look up high and to the right – visualize the new (5) Clifton Cultural Arts Center's green roof, coming in 2024! Turn right on Clifton, cross to the other side at Bryant, and continue northward. At Resor take a brief left to enjoy the garden at (6) #316 Resor and a small meditation garden at St. Johns Unitarian Church. Double back to Clifton, turn left and continue north, past two public schools, then cross McAlpin, and cross Clifton to the other side at the Woolper light.

A short block northward, turn right on Greendale to enjoy (7) the garden at #235. Farther down Greendale on the opposite side search for a Fairie Garden. Double back to Clifton Avenue, cross westward at Warren, walk on to Middleton Avenue. Turn right and head north to Lafayette Avenue. Turn left on Lafayette, cross and then turn right on North Cliff Lane, bearing left on to West Cliff Lane to enjoy the stately (8) Henry Probasco mansion and garden at #430. You can keep walking straight to cross the small pedestrian bridge and climb the hill back to Lafayette. Or retrace your steps to Lafayette where you have a choice: Turn right to walk to (9) Mt. Storm Park for the trees, gardens and Temple of Love. Or turn left on Lafayette to walk back to Middleton.



### (You are at mile 2!)

When you return to Middleton, turn right and walk on straight to McAlpin. On the east side of the street you'll discover-just two lots south of War-

ren- an (10) artfully cleared ravine. On the west side of the street at the McAlpin intersection you'll see the newly restored (11) Rawson Woods Preserve ironwork arch. Cross McAlpin and continue southward up the hill on Middleton to enjoy a (12) large garden on the left at #360 Resor. Turn right on Evanswood, head up the hill, and look to the left at the (13) hillside garden just before Cornell. Jog a quick right on Cornell and jog again left to continue on Evanswood which concludes with a sharp left bend. See (14) gardens that wrap around two sides of #577. Now you are on Morrison. Walk on to Ludlow Avenue. (Congratulations, you've completed 3

Begin at Brookline and Ludlow to view three historic stone houses by architect **Samuel Hannaford**. **(1) The home of "Boss" Cox**, now Clifton Branch Library (1895) is built in the Chateauesque style; a **(2) Queen Anne style home** (1898); and the **(3) Richardsonian Romanesque home** (1890) with conical tower and rusticated limestone. Hannaford's firm designed over 300 buildings from the mid-19th century into the 1960s.

Enter Burnet Woods on Brookline, walk towards Burnet Woods Lake and pass Carl Freund's (4) Trailside Nature Center (1939). A devotee of Frank Lloyd Wright, Freund designed over 30 buildings for Cincinnati Parks. Walk across the bridge and overflow along the west side of the lake, up the hill towards Martin Luther King Blvd. At ML King look up the hill to the (5) Henry Hobson Richardson monument, a grouping of intricately carved stone ruins from the Chamber of Commerce building that burned down in 1910. His influential late 19th-century buildings gave rise to the style "Richardsonian Romanesque".

Walk west on ML King and cross it at Clifton Avenue, cross Clifton westward and continue on ML King to the left fork onto Riddle Road. Turn left on Marshall Avenue, walk downhill. Around the bend you'll discover **Coy Field**, a hidden Recreation Commission playfield. Walk through the park to a stairway leading to Wagner Street, continue on Wagner one block to Tafel. Take a second set of steps to Straight Street, carefully cross, continue on Luna. Turn left on Clemmer Street and at the end of the street find steps leading up to McMillan Avenue.

Turn left on McMillan, cross Ravine Street to **(6) St. Monica Church** (1928). Peek inside to view the German-made stained-glass windows. Cross Mc-Millan, cross Ravine, and walk down Old McMillan, a short dead-end street seemingly from a different era. Double back and turn right on Fairview Avenue, an extra wide street that once was a streetcar route. The top landing of the **(7) Fairview Incline**- one of five 19th century inclines- was at Warner and Fairview Avenue.

Double back on Fairview to Warner, walk downhill to Ravine, turn right to enter (8) Fairview Park. The view from the Overlook includes downtown, Overthe-Rhine, the West End, Union Terminal, Price Hill, the Ohio River and the Kentucky hills. Return to Ravine, walk back uphill to Warner, turn right. Walk eastward down Warner Street, passing (9) the original Fairview School (1889). Now apartments, this Richardsonian Romanesque structure is one of Henry Siter's few remaining buildings. Cross Clifton Avenue, continue uphill to Ohio Avenue. Turn right and walk a block to (10) Bellevue Park, site of another incline and another Carl Freund-designed building. Built in 1955 the pavilion features a cluster of columns supporting a rounded canopy and offers another stunning city view of downtown, OTR and Mt. Adams.

Leave the park, walking north to the end of Ohio Avenue. Cross McMillan and Calhoun, turn right and pass (11) the former St. George Church (1879),

another Hannaford design and now home to the Crossroads congregation. The steel open lattice twin steeples replaced the originals which burned in a 2008 fire. Walk on toward Jefferson Avenue, cross Classen Park, then proceed north on Jefferson to Corry Street. Turn left to enter the UC Campus which was transformed by landscape architect George Hargreaves who eliminated surface parking lots and organized buildings around greenspace. Hargreaves also created the original master plan for Smale Riverfront Park.

Turn right on the walkway along Sheakley Lawn, and bear left at (12) The Richard E. Lindner Recreation Center, a boomerang-shaped building with triangular shaped openings, designed by Bernard Tschumi. Staying close to the building, descend the steps at the end of the walk and take the elevated walkway beneath the (13) UC Campus Recreation Cen**ter** that skirts the north side of Nippert Stadium. Designed by Thomas Mayne, the complex building of rounded forms and angles includes recreation facilities, classrooms, a food hall and residences, all fit into a tight site. Look left to the (14) Mantei Engineering Center, a massive brick and stone building with a barrel-shaped roof designed by Michael Graves, a UC graduate who, like Mayne and Tschumi, has designed prominent buildings around the globe. Continue walking northward through (15) The Campus Commons Green, formerly a parking lot, to ML King Blvd. Cross and turn left on ML King, turn right on Bishop to enter Burnet Woods down a flight of stone steps. At the bottom turn right and

## Reflections in a lake

As you walk east from Diggs's Plaza on Ludlow Avenue toward Brookline Avenue, turn right to find yourself in an Audubon-designated Important Birding Area. You are in Burnet Woods! An old majestic white oak with exfoliating trunk and branches is on your right. On your left the gently sloped valley is surrounded by several 80 to 100-year-old pin oaks and beech trees with smooth elephant skin-like bark.

Trailside Nature Center and the famous concrete slide are further south. Both were constructed during the Great Depression as part of the WPA. The lower playground and picnic shelter are behind the nature center. Further south is a large man-made lake, a magnet for migrating birds and anglers of all ages. Red-winged blackbirds sing throatily, hoping to be rewarded with a mate. Geese and ducks dot the lake and engage in loud confrontation when rivals approach their mates. Migrating warblers sing by the lake in spring and fall, their presence sought out by avid birders.

Red-tailed hawks soar above the mature tree canopy on sunny days, and a walk at sunset offers you sight and sound of a barred owl. As a Cooper's hawk hunts in the woods, you can hear birds in the trees raising the alarm about its presence. A blue heron has been a frequent visitor for the last two years, perching atop a slippery elm tree by the edge of the lake at sunset.

I never tire of the many reflections in the pond. Reflected images of slowly leafing bald cypresses and dawn redwoods are overlaid with the pink of flowering redbud trees in the spring. Can you picture a rainbow arching into the lake on a hot summer's day, fall colors rivaling the color palettes of the Impressionists, a beautiful sunset in winter? All this beauty is just a walk away. You just have to be there to witness it.



In the late 1980's a woman called to say that, after more than 30 years of living in her Clifton home, she was set to move to Scarlet Oaks. Climbing stairs and the many daily requirements of living alone had become impossible for her. "I will leave the front door unlocked, just come on in," she said.

I knocked on the door and a voice welcomed me into the charming two-story cottage. A bright-eyed elderly lady sat in her wingback chair. Apologizing for the mess, she explained that she could not walk well. Her bright smile nearly overrode the room's visual chaos and odors. I sat down and we discussed her plans and the urgency. Sadly, her son was not present to help.

She asked me to tour the house on my own. I began in the kitchen which told a bleak story, as did

the day bed in the solarium. The basement laundry room had been long abandoned. But examining photos on the walls, I could see beyond her current shaky existence into an earlier life, one of happy travels and family vacations. Times of a lovely home kept with pride, obvious in nicely upholstered chairs, in wallpaper chosen with care. Artworks stood out, possibly originals? A whimsical Miro, a small Picasso portrait, other pieces of outstanding quality.

Returning to the living room, I sat again and we talked about the artworks. Her family had been collectors, and her favorite pieces could move with her to her new accommodations. She was ready to be gone from this home. Though a painful meeting, I knew that I could help her begin a manageable new life chapter. I contacted a young family that

had a limited budget but also was handy and capable of taking on the challenge of renewing this house. After just one showing, we agreed: they would get rid of stuff the owner would leave behind and then they would purchase the home.

Years later, I had the opportunity to sell that home again – renovated and reimagined by the new owners who had raised two children there.

Barbra Druffel grew up in Clifton, daughter of Jane Druffel who proceeded her in the real estate business. She has lived in many Clifton homes and has helped many others find and resell theirs.



# **CANS FOOD PANTRY and Community Learning Center**

the community. In partnership with the CANS Girl Scout Troop, we've started an initiative to build an outdoor food pantry for our neighborhood.



# The Balch Carriage House (1880-1961) Old McDonald's Enigmatic Remnant

Majestic iron gates marked with a B for "Balch" stand guard at the eastern end of Wood Avenue, the back door to what originally was Alexander McDonald's grand estate. Just beyond lies a newish, very popular petite soccer pitch, shaded in the mornings by the very vacant, yet hopeful **Balch**Carriage House, one of 43 properties listed in 1978 by the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Clifton Avenue Historic District. Cincinnati Public Schools owns the building.



If you've had no reason to visit the back side of Fairview Clifton German Language School, you might not know

or care about the existence of this extraordinary one-and-a-half-story rusticated random rock-faced stone structure with gambrel roof. But there it is, a treasure on Clifton's hilltop campus.

For a while in 2008 the Carriage House was in the possession of Clifton Cultural Arts Center. Leslie Mooney, director of CCAC says, "In 2014 we raised funds to replace the entire roof and paint the upper gables to preserve the building for future use. While it was in our care, CCAC's community

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volunteers frequently repaired plexiglass window coverings."

CPS again owns this stepchild of a structure. Asked what aspirations her school community might have, Fairview Clifton Principal Savannah Rabal said, "We would love for the Carriage House to be an outdoor learning space. If the doors and windows were removed in a way to create an open-air space, that would be awesome. Having a climate-controlled storage space would also be ok, just not our first pick."

Any use of the building would require substantial work, costing well over a million dollars.

Community use would be possible, as are all our public school facilities, with the submittal of a Building Use Permit Application to CPS Facilities.

As we know in Clifton, where there's a will, there is always a way! This charming and valuable historic structure could be enjoyed in our collective future with discussion and a new plan.

The Alexander McDonald Mansion — "Dalvey" — was built at 3645 Clifton Avenue by Samuel Hannaford for the president of Standard Oil of Kentucky who was also director of the Big Four

Railroad (Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis), the Third National Bank and the Carnegie Trust Company. A lover of the arts, McDonald served as vice president of the Cincinnati Art Museum and director of both the College of Music and the May Festival. Valued at \$15 million when he died in 1910, and leaving no will, his estate was passed to his two granddaughters Laura and Helena McDonald Stallo who shared equally. Investments were managed by their father who, unfortunately, saw them reduced to nothing. As part of many transactions, Dalvey was sold in 1911 to Mrs. Edith Woodford Balch for \$1. She and her husband George moved from another important Hannaford house on Greendale Avenue, just a block away. Widowed in 1932, Edith continued living in the great mansion until her death in 1957 when the 6.6-acre property was willed to the Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio, which in turn sold the property to Cincinnati Public Schools in 1958, allowing for the expansion of Clifton School. No longer practical for mid-century uses, the mansion was demolished in 1961.

Still, the sturdy carriage house remains.


# The Lost Mansions of Lafayette Avenue

Nostalgic Clifton, let's remember a few grand structures that are now just "castles in the air." Much has been written about Lafayette Avenue's existing mansions, but not about three more splendid homes that existed on the north side of the street between Clifton and North Cliff avenues. Replaced by the Cincinnati Women's Club and the Middleton Court subdivision in the 1960s, we can now only imagine their splendor. Let your imagination wander here...



McAlpin Mansion

At the northwest corner of Clifton and Lafayette avenues we pass the location of Clifton's very first chapel — a two-floor frame structure "without architectural merit" that served early Clifton families from 1843 until 1867 as a social hub and meeting hall. This is when its congregation moved south on Clifton to the new Hannaford-designed Calvary Episcopal Church, still with us today. The little old chapel now only exists as a tiny church icon on old maps, but its parsonage still stands, if a little remotely, at 3960 Clifton Avenue.

Continue westward to 318 Lafayette to envision the "Sunflower House" built around 1884 by George Washington McAlpin of department store fame. Many sunflower motifs decorated the architecture of his grand new home, the scale of which was a considerable change from his former 1870s home at 429 Resor Avenue. You may have guessed that McAlpin Avenue takes its name from this family.

Still strolling west in the direction that now leads to Mount Storm Park (but in the day was the approach



to the magnificent Bowler estate, greenhouses and gardens), you come to the splendid mansion of H.W. Darby at 352 Lafayette, built just before the Civil War. Mr. Darby owned Darby Publishing, located downtown at the northwest corner of Fourth and Elm streets in a handsome building that still proudly stands.

Finally, you are before 378 Lafayette Avenue, the palatial property of the Wilson family, built in the 1850's. Later known as the Jergen Estate (as in Jergen's lotion), it was admired for its striking Italianate architecture, vast front lawn (frequently used for golfing), and the finest carriage house in Clifton.



# **Romero Academy at Annunciation**

In August 2023, Clifton children in grades PK-5 will have the new opportunity to attend Romero Academy at Annunciation, an independent Catholic school that partners with families to develop the intellect, form the character, and engage the faith of children from a variety of backgrounds, often at no cost to parents through full-tuition scholarships from Ohio's EdChoice Scholarship Programs.

Nora, a mother and member of the Clifton community, says she's "most excited about the vibrancy new Romero students will bring to the historical Annunciation campus," as well as the opportunity for Clifton children to be "part of something bigger than themselves."

"My husband and I moved to Clifton to raise our children in an international, diverse, intellectual, and historic community," says Nora. "Romero brings a modern educational model to a historic Catholic institution in an updated and inclusive way, while still retaining traditional values like faith, courage, wisdom, self-control, and justice."

Annunciation will be the second Romero Academy in Cincinnati following the 2020 opening of Resurrection, a successful PK-8 school in Price Hill. Recent test scores show Resurrection students growing nearly 78% in math and 77% in reading year over year, faster than their peers across the country. Inspired by the words of St. Oscar Romero, Annunciation students "will aspire not to have more, but to be more."

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# **Cincinnati State Students Honored at National Competition**

Students from the Landscape Horticulture, Sustainable Horticulture, and Turfgrass Management programs at Cincinnati State spent their spring break competing at the 47th National Collegiate Landscape Competition at Mississippi State University. They earned fourth place out of the 46 colleges represented. Besting their honor of fifth place in 2022 at North Carolina State University, and matching their fourth place in 2019 at Colorado State University, 13 students also earned top 10 finishes in their respective events:

Maureen "Mo" Comella in Employee Development and in Business Management; Brittany Dove in Turf and Turf Pest Identification; Ben Gressle in Safety First; Catherine LaGasse in Irrigation Troubleshooting; Isaac Ludke in Irrigation; Troubleshooting and Irrigation Assembly; Jacob "Mel" Melvin in Truck and Trailer Operation, in Landscape Lighting, in Irrigation Assembly, in Small Engine Repair, in Arboriculture. Mel was the highest scoring in our group, earning ninth place out of 600+ students competing; Nat Kutcher – A first-time attendee, Nat won first place in Robotics and Technology and eighth in Safety First; Alexsis Perrmann in Plant Problem Diagnosis and in Employee Development; Jon Smotherman in Construction Cost Estimating; Tayla Smart in Computer-Aided Design; Ricci Sena in Arboriculture; Sawyer Sanders in Truck and Trailer Operation; Kelsey Vance in Plant Problem Diagnosis



At the scholarship reception, team member Tiffany Chen received the TruGreen Environmental Stewardship Scholarship Award of \$2500 towards her tuition and fees at Cincinnati State.

While on the trip, students also enjoyed a brief stop and picnic lunch at the 14,000-acre Bernheim Forest and Arboretum outside of Louisville and toured the Opryland Hotel indoor gardens in Nashville. Also of note, one of the new participants was Tuskegee University, the first HBCU (Historically Black Colleges and Universities) to ever attend.

The faculty and team members send out a big thank you to all our coaches and company sponsors, without them we would not be nearly so successful! The Cincinnati State team also congratulates first place overall winner Cuyahoga Community College, one of our sister colleges from the Cleveland area.

The National Collegiate Landscape Competition is held yearly by the National Association of Landscape Professionals at colleges and universities around the country. 



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## **A Cliftonite Overheard**



Salmon P. Chase
(aged 23) to Alexis de
Tocqueville (aged 26)
in December 1831
during the French
writer's nine-month
tour of America which
included a four-day visit
to Cincinnati. A French
aristocrat, Tocqueville
and Gustave de

Beaumont had received permission to travel to America to research prison reform. But they also wanted to study democracy and society in America, harvesting ideas to help mold France's political future. Imagine the three young men, sitting at the fireplace in Chase's Clifton farm, tucked in just behind the gates that today mark Cypress Gardens Avenue.

After Andrew Jackson won the presidency in 1828, Chase was disdainful of how such candidates were elected. He intoned, "By flattering everybody, a thing which men of character will never do; by mixing with the mob; by basely flattering its emotions; by drinking together... I think, and I am convinced that there is not a man of distinction in the Union but feels that a very extended suffrage is a fatal thing. But they cannot fight against the flood of public opinion which is flowing perpetually in this direction."

# Deer Population Falls 39% in Seven Years



In the chilly pre-dawn hours of February 12, volunteers with the Clifton Deer Program quietly watched as 1.5-year-old Doe #95 awoke in an Amazon Avenue yard and strolled off to rejoin her family after being spayed by a veterinarian. She was the seventh and final deer to be treated during Clifton Deer's 2022/2023 field season.

One deer treated this season (Doe #90) immigrated into the study area last summer and resides in the Scarlet Oaks area. The other six were captured near Clifton Avenue, along the northeast border of our study area (approximately 1 sq. mile bounded by I-75, Ludlow Avenue, and Clifton Avenue). These deer appear to have home ranges that lie mostly east of Clifton Avenue (outside of the study area) but that overlap with the northeast corner of the study area. Because they are only in the study area part-time, capturing them took a lot of patience and skill from our intrepid darters!

Our annual post-operations population survey demonstrated continued progress toward the goal of an eco-sustainable deer population: The study area deer population is down 4.8% since last year and 39% since the program began. With an aging herd and very few new fawns (approximately 98% of the adult does within the study area are sterilized), we expect the population level to continue its gradual decline as long as immigration stays relatively low.

Thanks to our dedicated volunteers and the generosity of UCAN Nonprofit Spay and Neuter Clinic, our annual operating costs remained below \$8000 for the second year in a row. The Clifton Deer Program is grateful to our generous donors, enthusiastic and unflappable volunteers, and gracious neighbors who volunteer their yards for bait sites and who report deer sightings through the "Report Tagged Deer" portal at <a href="https://www.cliftondeer.org">www.cliftondeer.org</a>.
